
The Harper Creek High School Military Wall of Fame is located just inside the doors at varsity hall and displays the

In addition, it features plaques honoring those graduates who died in the line of duty, including Gary E. Salisbury – fallen 1968; Charles E. Outman – fallen 1969; Larry D. Beebe – fallen 1970; and Michael A. Dickenson II – fallen 2006. It is a tradition of honor that will span lifetimes and generation.

We cannot fail to mention our unique relationship with the SSG Michael A. Dickenson, II American Legion Post 257 located just across the street from the Harper Creek Administration Building. The post, whose name bears that of hometown fallen soldier and Harper Creek graduate, moved into the neighborhood only a few short years ago but nonetheless affects our schools and community in a profound manner. We are happy for their partnership on the installation and dedication of the 12th Man Flagpole at Harper Creek Stadium and their Color Guard presence at home events.

The SSG Michael A. Dickenson, II American Legion Post 257 is truly focused and committed to being good neighbors and community partners – not limited to those of us residing within the Harper Creek district but for our entire Battle Creek community at large.
